IV. COMMUNICATIONS

Chairman's Report:

Chairman David Hopper reported that he contacted the State Attorney's General Office regarding the current issue with wireless carriers not being compliant in submitting annual census information on the number of their customers operating in the ACOG region. He said he talked to Elizabeth Ryan in the Consumer's Protection Division, and was told there is no authority given in the law as written to enforce carriers to comply.

Interim Executive Director's Report:

In response to the current issue with the wireless carriers he said If we reopen the legislation with the intent to add punishment language, we would have to fight all of the original battles again, which would most likely not allow enforcement language. In the end the existing statute was a product of compromise to get what we have today. He said experience and history with this says that if the carriers open the legislation back up, then that would be the appropriate time to enter this process. He said we need to look at a new type of definition for revenue funding because we cannot get in front of every new dynamic technology and deal with a new piece of legislation dealing with each.

Chairman David Hopper asked if the current funding is sufficient. Mr. Johnson said, yes, for its current operations and we have additional revenues since 2005. We need to be looking at the revenue sources for the future.

A. PROPOSED NEW CONTRACT WITH JOHN M. ARLEDGE & ASSOCIATES, P.C., CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS, FOR PROFESSIONAL AUDITING SERVICES

Interim Executive Director John Johnson explained that the previous agreement with John M. Arledge & Associates, P.C., to provide professional auditing services to ACOG and 9-1-1 ACOG has expired. It is necessary to execute a contract for professional auditing services for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008, and with the option to renew for each of the four (4) subsequent fiscal years. After conducting an RFP process, John M. Arledge & Associates met the necessary criteria. Staff recommends that they be selected to conduct the annual audit for 9-1-1 ACOG, he said.

Director Ray Poland, Jones City, made a motion for the 9-1-1 ACOG Board to concur with the ACOG Board to authorize the Interim Executive Director to execute the contract with John M. VIII. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION ONLY

A. NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATOR WEEK ACTIVITIES

Wendi Marcy, 9-1-1 Special Programs Officer, reported that celebration of National Telecommunicator Week, April 13-19th was a great success across the 9-1-1 ACOG region. She explained that some of the activities included daily door prizes, which were donated by 26 vendors and local merchants; staff delivered gift bags to 183 dispatchers throughout the 9-1-1 region, and each dispatcher was given a National Telecommunicator Week 9-1-1 lapel pin. All PSAPs were invited to join in a PSAP decorating contest. Based on this year's theme, "The Heart of Public Safety," she said Norman was judged the winner with fabulous decorations and presentations. The second-place winner was the Midwest City Emergency Operations Center who captured the theme very well and honored their dispatchers.

Also, there was a reception held at the ACOG offices for the recipient of the Telecommunicator of the Year award, Christy Gordon, a 20-year veteran of public safety dispatch, from the Mustang Police Dept. Christy was awarded with a trophy, a certificate and a scholarship to attend the Public Safety Conference in Tulsa scheduled for October, and other prizes from various vendors.

Wendi expressed the Association's appreciation to Cox Communications, AT&T and Earl's Rib Palace for their large sponsorship which helped to make this year's National Telecommunicator Week a success. Wendi also thanked all of the 9-1-1 ACOG PSAPs for their efforts and participation.

IX. GENERAL STATUS

Stephen Willoughby informed the Board of Directors of a luncheon scheduled for May 5th at ACOG intended to help re-energize the regional Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) initiative. Originally, the communities committed to provide this life-saving service in the region are El Reno (Parkview EMS), Guthrie, Midwest City, Newcastle, Noble, Norman and Tuttle. He explained that this highly structured protocol system is nationally approved and allows dispatchers to give pre-arrival instructions under medical direction. 9-1-1 ACOG first implemented this Emergency Medical Dispatch protocol in 2004 and it was a \$250,000 public investment to our regional communities.

Mr. Willoughby reported that staff, at the request of the 9-1-1 Board of Directors, is gathering information from the other COGs (Council of Governments) in Oklahoma to compare information regarding wireless carriers reporting census information. To date, three COGs have responded, he said.

Mr. Willoughby reported that Cricket Wireless began providing wireless service earlier this month to the region. He indicated that it was disappointing that Cricket had not made the appropriate arrangements to coincide delivery of enhanced 9-1-1 service with their turn-up of service to their customers. 9-1-1 ACOG has escalated this concern within Cricket and there is a conference call scheduled for tomorrow to negotiate a schedule to deploy enhanced wireless 9-1-1 services for their customers.

Mr. Willoughby explained that staff is reviewing the FCC order to see how the region can ensure that carriers who begin operating in the future turn-up E9-1-1 when they turn on their commercial service.

It was suggested that each community's council require Phase II compliance from the wireless carriers before approving a lease with them.

Mr. Willoughby reported that since the last Board meeting, we have obtained census information from Verizon and they are now compliant.

X. NEW BUSINESS

Director Jim Pumphrey asked for a description of Reverse 9-1-1 and how to go about purchasing an emergency notification system.

Steve Willoughby explained that there are several different service providers selling early warning notification systems which uses a telephone database when in the event of a disaster or need, it pushes out a message to all of the telephone numbers in that database to a defined geographical area through a telephone system.

He said there are different communities that have a variance of the different service providers in the region.

Mr. Willoughby said about nine years ago we looked at doing that on a regional basis, however, after a thorough analysis, several cities already had obtained their own individual system, and we found no need to be redundant. Each community can invest into a system that best fits their individual need.

SUBJECT: Proposed FY 2007-2008 Budget Amendment

INFORMATION: 9-1-1 ACOG is well into its 2007-2008 fiscal year, and staff proposes to amend the budget to more closely reflect estimated revenues and expenditures and reflect Board actions taken throughout the fiscal year. Noted below are the most significant changes.

The original budget provided for the upgrade and replacement of the existing 9-1-1 answering software located at all 22 PSAPs. After the conclusion of an unsuccessful RFP process and an updated cost/benefit analysis, the Board authorized instead a one year extension to the maintenance contract for the existing 9-1-1 answering software. This action eliminated both the \$1,500,000 Other Financing Source from Capital Lease Proceeds and the corresponding \$1,500,000 Capital Outlay expenditure. It also reduced Debt Service expenditures by \$193,026 for Principal and \$74,290 for interest, eliminated \$35,150 in Training expenditures and increased Maintenance, Repairs and Warranty expenditures by \$150,000.

The proposed budget amendment reflects a decrease of \$50,618 in Contract revenues due to delays in renewing the EMSA and the Tinker Air Force Base contract extensions.

The original budget overestimated the amount of 9-1-1 fees remitted by wireless telephone companies by approximately \$6,020. This overestimation resulted from differences between the budgeted and actual annual census allocation percentages.

The proposed budget amendment reflects an increase of \$2,000 in interest income due to the decrease in interest rates.

In summary, the original budget reflected an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$478,222 while the proposed budget amendment reflects an excess of \$572,170, which is a positive increase of \$93,948.

SUBJECT: NextGEN911 Telcom Task Force

INFORMATION: Technology is moving at the speed of innovation. This movement is causing massive shift in the mobility of communications, creating convenience and flexibility for business communications as well as our personal uses of communications. But, lost in this technological movement is the ever present role of public safety and 9-1-1. Yes, usually it is the last component considered as new bells and whistles are created to sell to consumers.

When we prepare to plan our networks to make that next technological change, only modest thought is given to the public safety challenges that are brought about by the “next thing” even when the new technology may offer better ways to do the job. Specifically, often lost in the mix is how these new technologies interface with enhanced 9-1-1 systems.

To assist in understanding these new issues, 9-1-1 ACOG has partnered with the Oklahoma Chapter of the National Emergency Number Association (NENA) to create a NextGEN911 (Next Generation 9-1-1) Telcom Task Force. The task force will consist of representatives from 9-1-1 agencies, local exchange carriers, competitive local exchange carriers, VoIP Service Providers, and other interested parties wanting to participate in the discussion of how this technology evolution is impacting 9-1-1.

This approach is similar to the Competitive Local Exchange Carrier (CLEC) Task Force that 9-1-1 ACOG created approximately five years ago to address the explosion of new landline telephone service providers in Central Oklahoma. Results of that task force included a better mutual understanding of the interactions, formation of local policies, and adjustments of state regulatory requirements.

The first meeting of the NextGEN911 Telcom Task Force will be Friday, May 30th at 10:00 a.m. in the ACOG Boardroom.

SUBJECT: General Status Report

CRICKET WIRELESS

Last month staff reported that Cricket Wireless began providing wireless service in the region prior to deploying wireless enhanced 9-1-1. Staff escalated this concern within Cricket which resulted in them dedicating additional resources and expediting their deployment schedule. After over a week of testing, Cricket came into compliance with 9-1-1 ACOG's Phase II request on May 6, having successfully tested with the 23 Central Oklahoma PSAPs.

WIRELESS CENSUS

As asked by the Board, ACOG requested census reporting information from the other 10 Councils of Government (COG) in the state. Five COGs responded. None have census information from carriers who provide service in the ACOG area as well. And, in some cases, ACOG has census information from carriers who had not provided the same to the other COGs.
