1. CALL TO ORDER

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - MAY 28, 2020

Director Sheila Stevenson, Langston City, made a motion to approve the May 28, 2020 Garber-Wellington Association Policy Committee minutes. Director Brian Grider, Mustang, seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

4. STAFF REPORT

A. Navigable Waters Protection Rule - Clarifying The Clean Water Act

On April 21, 2020, the EPA and the Department of the Army (Army) published the Navigable Waters Protection Rule to define "waters of the United States" (WOTUS) in the Federal Register. In addition, the Supreme Court ruled that some groundwater discharge also comes under the Clean Water Act.

EPA and the Army have simplified the Navigable Waters Protection Rule into four parts. They are:

Territorial Seas and Traditional Navigable Waters. These are
waterbodies that are obviously navigable waters, such as a
navigable water like the Mississippi River, a tidally-influenced
waterbody like the territorial waters of the Pacific Ocean off of
California, or a water used for interstate commerce like the Great
Lakes.

- Tributaries to Navigable Waters. Examples are a perennial tributary that contributes surface flow, or a snowpack-fed intermittent tributary that contributes surface flow.
- Certain Lakes, Ponds, and Impoundments. These include a lake that
 contributes surface flow to a traditional navigable water, a pond
 that contributes surface flow to a traditional navigable water, or an
 impoundment that contributes surface flow to a traditional
 navigable water.
- Adjacent Wetlands. These include wetlands that abut a traditional navigable water, wetlands with manmade structures that allow surface connection, or wetlands that are adjacent to a traditional navigable water.

Non-WOTUS waterbodies include dry washes and ephemeral streams, farm ditches, roadside ditches, and stormwater runoff.

B. Drought Update

A couple of important climatological milestones have been reached as Oklahoma begins the next major drought cycle.

Pacific Ocean temperature analysis on June 3 shows that a La Nina cooling event is developing. A value of 0.5 degree Celsius below average has been reached. The half-degree Celsius below average is the threshold for La Nina.

La Nina is the term given when Pacific Ocean equatorial temperatures reach a sustained value of at least 0.5 degree Celsius below average. La Nina presence during the U.S. summer has been correlated to hotter and drier conditions in the U.S. Midwest.

The second milestone is the development of extreme drought conditions outside the Oklahoma Panhandle. Extreme drought conditions now exist in Kingfisher, Blaine and Dewey Counties.

The development of drought in what is the wettest time of the year (May and June) underscores the gravity of this situation and gives more weight to the argument that the next drought cycle has begun.

C. Sandstone Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Oklahoma County-Update

Two more cross-sections have been completed through Oklahoma County and a preliminary net sand map of sequence 71 has been produced.

EVALUATING A WELL FIELD

INFORMATION:

Garber-Wellington Association staff receives many requests to evaluate groundwater resources. Most are easily managed, but occasionally there is a need to do further analysis. This was the case with the Winter Creek system. The following are some observations that need to be discussed.

The Winter Creek system lies outside the Garber-Wellington aquifer system. It is in the El Reno aquifer. This aquifer has rocks that have less ability to transmit water into a well bore and thus the wells in the aquifer have less yield than those found in the Garber-Wellington aquifer.

Many people promoting a well system emphasize initial yields found on the driller's log. This is a mistake, as the initial yields rarely compare to the yields observed in production a year or two later. One instead should observe the Monthly Operational Reports (MORs) to verify the well yield.

Based on the MORs, one can then calculate the radius of influence of the well and an optimal production schedule. In the case of the Winter Creek system, a regimen of 35 gpm for three days and a recovery of one day may be the optimal schedule, assuming that full recovery takes 24 hrs. From this, an estimate of the full yield of the well can be determined.

One should also take static and pumping water level measurements to help determine the transmissivity of the aquifer in that location and refine the yield estimations.

SANDSTONE MAPPING UPDATE FOR THE GARBER-WELLINGTON AQUIFER, OKLAHOMA COUNTY

INFORMATION:

Five structural cross-sections made through the center and southern part of Oklahoma County. The purpose of the cross-sections is to help map out sandstones in the Garber-Wellington aquifer. Water wells in high porosity sandstones generally have much higher yields.

These sections incorporate geophysical well logs along the strike and dip of the Garber sandstone. Previous stratigraphic correlation work in Cleveland County detailed 10 zones where there was some lateral continuity of sands and shales. Preliminary sand maps of three of these zones (sequences 71, 51 and 31) have been produced.

INFORMATION:

Summer 2020 is turning out to be a most unusual ride for all of us.

In June we officially entered La Nina conditions in the east Pacific, which has been correlated to hotter and drier conditions in the U.S. Midwest. We also developed extreme drought conditions outside the Oklahoma Panhandle, extending into Kingfisher, Blaine and Dewey Counties.

July was a wet month – the 13th wettest July on record. This diminished the drought situation immensely, with extreme drought conditions now holding onto just a small corner of Cimarron County. Central Oklahoma is drought-free with the exception of a small dry area in Cleveland County.

However, all this rain did not translate into much recharge to the aquifer. This is due to the fact that the evaporation rates are very high in July. The July average recharge is 0.14 inches; the aquifer got 0.04 inches in July 2020, or less than a third of the normal July recharge. This puts us well under the curve for the year – we will need a good, wet autumn to get back to average.

ACOG Drought Program

Oklahoma is now experiencing a much different climate than in the 1980-90 decades. We are going back to the more severe dry/wet cycles seen in the 1950-60 era. Static water levels have finally returned to pre-drought levels seen in 2010, ending a nine and a half year cycle of groundwater drought.

We have now entered La Nina territory for the Eastern Pacific Ocean temperatures. La Nina is the term given when Pacific Ocean equatorial temperatures reach a sustained value of at least 0.5 degree Celsius below average. La Nina presence during the U.S. summer has been correlated to hotter and drier conditions in the U.S. Midwest. The drought of 2011-13 started with a large La Niña event.

The progress of drought in Oklahoma in June was halted and reversed in July. July 2020 was the 13th wettest July on record and dramatically impacted the drought situation in Oklahoma. Central Oklahoma is now drought-free with the exception of a small dry area in Cleveland County. Unfortunately this did not translate into recharge for the aquifer – the July total was about a third of normal recharge. Since the last progress report, two monthly drought reports have been generated.

18604(b) - Stratigraphic Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Oklahoma County As part of a 604(b) grant, staff is continuing and extending net sand maps originally created as part of a drilling project with the City of Norman. This effort will allow drillers to focus their efforts in areas with more sandstone, thus increasing well capacity.

Work commenced in March 2020. To date six regional cross-sections have been completed.

20604(b) - Stratigraphic Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Southern Logan County As part of a 604(b) grant, staff will continue and extend net sand maps created in the 18604(b) and 19604(b) projects into southern Logan County and southern Cleveland County. This effort will allow drillers to focus their efforts in areas with more sandstone, thus increasing well capacity.

Workplan was accepted by the EPA in July 2020.
