1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Kim Bishop called the meeting to order at 3:45 p.m.

2. INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - MAY 28, 2020

Director Josh Moore, Edmond, made a motion to approve the June 25, 2020 Garber-Wellington Association Policy Committee minutes. Director David Bennett, The Village, seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

4. STAFF REPORT

A. Evaluating a Well Field

GWA staff receives many requests to evaluate groundwater resources. Staff was asked to evaluate the Winter Creek system which lies outside the Garber-Wellington aquifer system. It is in the El Reno aquifer. This aquifer has rocks that have less ability to transmit water into a well bore and thus the wells in the aquifer have less yield than those found in the GW aquifer.

Preliminary evaluation used initial well yields, which is erroneous. Initial yields rarely compare to the yields observed in production a year or two later. One instead should observe the Monthly Operational Reports (MORs) to see what the wells are capable of. One should also take static and pumping water level measurements to help determine the transmissivity of the aquifer in that location and refine the yield estimations.

B. Sandstone Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Oklahoma County-Update Two more cross-sections have been completed through Oklahoma County and a preliminary net sand maps of sequences 71, 51 and 31 has been produced.

C. Drought Update

In June we officially entered La Nina conditions in the east Pacific, which has been correlated to hotter and drier conditions in the U.S. Midwest. We also developed extreme drought conditions outside the Oklahoma Panhandle, extending into Kingfisher, Blaine and Dewey Counties. Central Oklahoma is drought-free with the exception of a small dry area in Cleveland County.

Despite a wet July, this did not translate into much recharge to the aquifer. The aquifer got 0.04 inches in July 2020, or less than a third of the normal July recharge. This puts us well under the curve for the year – we will need a good, wet autumn to get back to average.

INFORMATION:

In October 2020 we now have gone into official La Nina conditions. About 60% of Oklahoma is in an abnormally dry condition and about 30% is in at least moderate drought conditions. Approximately two and a half percent of Oklahoma is in extreme drought conditions. About 344,325 people in Oklahoma are being affected by drought at the present time.

Although there are other factors involved in drought creation, La Nina is one of the big climatological drivers in Oklahoma weather. La Niña winters set up dry persistent conditions that can lead into drought. A La Niña in late 2010 set up the conditions for the drought of 2011-13. Unfortunately, the situation is eerily similar to ten years ago. The forecast models show the timing and intensity of the 2020-21 La Nina event is almost identical to what we saw in 2010-11. In October 2010 we had no drought in Oklahoma. In October 2011 over half the state was in exceptional drought.

In case we have forgot what happened ten years ago, Canton Lake dropped to 22% capacity, Lake Altus went to 14%, and Tom Steed stood at 27%. Our water supply was dangerously low.

Aquifer recharge is the bright spot in the present picture. September provided 0.18 inches of recharge, bringing the recharge rate to almost average for the year. October is usually a month where we see good recharge start to happen; however, this October is providing us with no rain at all. Static water levels at present time are holding; however it is expected to drop soon, due to the rather grim November precipitation forecast by NOAA.

TINKER AFB RESTORATION ADVISORY BOARD - PFO & PFOA UPDATE

INFORMATION:

The Air Force began using Aqueous Film Forming Foam (AFFF) in the 1970's as a firefighting agent. In 2009, the EPA began issuing provisional Health Advisories for compounds in the AFFF, specifically perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFO) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA). These are emergent contaminants on the federal advisory list. Regulatory standards are still evolving for these contaminants.

At present, Tinker Air Force Base is in the identification stage and is locating sites where these contaminants might be in the groundwater. Because there may be pathways to drinking sources outside of the base (specifically groundwater), an offsite investigation strategy has been created.

The timeline for the investigation includes door-to-door surveying and sampling in November 2020, focused on private wells used for drinking water. Preliminary sampling results will be available January 2021.

INFORMATION:

At present there have been eight structural cross-sections made through the center and southern part of Oklahoma County. These sections incorporate geophysical well logs along the strike and dip of the Garber sandstone.

The next phase consists of generating net sand maps from these cross sections, using depositional models as a guide for interpretation.

Final maps and reports anticipated to ready at the end of the year.

ACOG Drought Program

Oklahoma is now experiencing a much different climate than in the 1980-90 decades. We are going back to the more severe dry/wet cycles seen in the 1950-60 era. Static water levels have finally returned to pre-drought levels seen in 2010, ending a nine and a half year cycle of groundwater drought.

However, in October 2020 we are now experiencing a new La Nina. La Nina is the term given when Pacific Ocean equatorial temperatures reach a sustained value of at least 0.5 degree Celsius below average. La Nina presence has been correlated to hotter and drier conditions in the U.S. Midwest. The drought of 2011-13 started with a large La Niña event.

The progress of drought in Oklahoma has increased greatly over the past weeks. About 60% of Oklahoma is in an abnormally dry condition and about 30% is in at least moderate drought conditions. Approximately two and a half percent of Oklahoma is in extreme drought conditions. About 344,325 people in Oklahoma are being affected by drought at the present time.

Since the last progress report, two monthly drought reports have been generated.

18604(b) - Stratigraphic Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Oklahoma County
As part of a 604(b) grant, staff is continuing and extending net sand maps originally
created as part of a drilling project with the City of Norman. This effort will allow drillers
to focus their efforts in areas with more sandstone, thus increasing well capacity.

Work commenced in March 2020. To date eight regional cross-sections have been completed.

20604(b) - Stratigraphic Mapping Garber-Wellington Aquifer Southern Logan County As part of a 604(b) grant, staff will continue and extend net sand maps created in the 18604(b) and 19604(b) projects into southern Logan County and southern Cleveland County. This effort will allow drillers to focus their efforts in areas with more sandstone, thus increasing well capacity.

Workplan was accepted by the EPA in July 2020. Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) is due next March.
