A. CALL TO ORDER

Jennifer Sebesta called the meeting to order at 9:11 a.m.

B. APPROVAL OF THE OCTOBER 14, 2021, MEETING MINUTES

Petya Stefanoff moved to approve the October 14, 2021, minutes. Jan Fees seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

C. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION ONLY:

1. AAA Route 66 Road Fest

Eric Pollard said that in 2026, the American Mother Road, Route 66, will celebrate its 100th anniversary. In celebration of this upcoming milestone, the American Automobile Association (AAA) is creating the first ever Route 66 Road Fest with events in Oklahoma City on June 18 and 19 and in Tulsa on June 25 and 26.

Anne Oakley and Mike Wilkinson of Jordan Advertising (Route 66 Road Fest marketing partners) gave a presentation to the committee on the festivities. The presentation can be viewed here: https://www.acogok.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/04/Centinneal-Commission-PP-3-6.pdf.

2. 2021 Building Permit Fee Survey Results

Hannah Nolen highlighted the information provided in the agenda memorandum. She presented the committee with the detailed survey results. Twelve municipalities completed the survey and the average combined building permit cost in 2021 was \$1,013 (the high was \$2,385 and the low was \$200). The average combined utility fees cost in 2021 was \$1,838. Average building permit and utility fees combined cost in the region was \$3,038.

3. Planning and Zoning Application Fees Survey

Hannah Nolen said ACOG periodically conducts a building permit fee survey to determine the costs of residential and commercial permits throughout the region. Similarly, ACOG is conducting another survey, this time asking about planning and zoning application fees. You can access the survey as follows: https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/2022FeeSurvey. Ms. Nolen asked the committee to complete the survey by April 7, 2022. The results of the survey will be brought to a future APTAC meeting.

4. 2022 Bike Month

Jordan Evans said Bike Month is coming up this May and ACOG is starting the planning process. Mr. Evans went over the events planned for this year's Bike Month. The kick-off event will be BikeFest to take place on Sunday, May 1, 2022, from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. ACOG will also host the Bicycle Scavenger Hunt and help with Bike to Work Day rides as well.

D. Updates from Members

Sasha McCrone said Oklahoma City is developing a major planning document for transportation products. She said updates to bikewalkokc will be completed this summer.

Purvi Patel said Choctaw has a number of subdivisions under construction right now and hoping to see a lot of building permit fees. Ms. Patel said Choctaw approved transportation impact fees in September, and they have raised \$75,000, which goes towards maintenance of roads. They are planning a workshop with the planning commission and city council in May.

Dan Kassik said Guthrie is looking at the Community Economic Resiliency Initiative (CERI) Grant for trails, and they also applied for the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET) grant funding, as well as a grant with Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department (OTRD) for possible funding for bike trails. They have started talking with Edmond to plan a bike path that ties to Guthrie. The goal is to have a bike trail from Edmond to downtown Guthrie.

David Anderson said Canadian County maintains 15 miles of Route 66. He said when the Oklahoma Department of Transportation took Route 66 off their system it became the responsibility of Canadian County to maintain it.

Jan Fees said Edmond is looking forward to zoning fee discussions because they recognize their zoning fees are low. Ms. Fees said the east Edmond plan will be on the next city council meeting agenda for adoption. The Edmond Shift Mobility Plan is moving along as planned. Edmond has new developments in the downtown area and new residential development areas. Ms. Fees said March 23 – 26 is the Congress of New Urbanism conference in Oklahoma City; they are doing a local workshop to walk around downtown Edmond.

INFORMATION:

The way our communities and physical environment are designed, built, and operated can improve quality of life and enable an environmentally and socially responsible, healthy, and prosperous environment.

Green buildings and communities are proven to save money, improve efficiency, reduce pollution, and create healthier places for people. They are a critical part of addressing climate change, meeting Environmental Social Governance (ESG) goals, enhancing resilience, and supporting more equitable communities.

Planners in Oklahoma can support these efforts in several ways. Various policy changes and code updates are being considered that could advance green buildings and communities, including the work of the Energy Conservation Technical Committee (ECTC) of the Oklahoma Uniform Building Code Commission.

Dr. Lee Fithian, who serves as the ECTC Vice Chair and is a University of Oklahoma Christopher C. Gibbs College of Architecture Associate Professor and Architecture Research Liaison, will provide an overview on green building trends and activity in Oklahoma with APTAC members and is interested in exploring partnership opportunities.

Dr. Fithian has a PhD in Engineering, is a Licensed Architect, a Certified Planner, and a LEED AP professional with over 35 years progressive design and project management experience. More on Dr. Fithian from the 'About' section of the University of Oklahoma Christopher C. Gibbs College of Architecture website:

Dr. Fithian's research and teaching efforts focus on the application of biological and ecological models to architectural design. She builds connections between interdisciplinary research and architectural design to conserve and regenerate air and water in urban and suburban environments. Each of her studios carries a strong focus on the technical development and integration of analytical visualizations in order to develop "green" architecture.
