A. CALL TO ORDER

Chair John M. Sharp called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. He introduced himself and entertained introductions of members, staff, and guests. There was a quorum.

B. APPROVAL OF THE APRIL 10, 2025, MINUTES

David Russell moved to approve the April 10, 2025, minutes. Erik Brandt seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

C. ACTION ITEM:

1. Norman Project Swap on Lindsey Street

John Sharp highlighted the information detailed in the agenda memorandum about this requested swap of projects in Norman. There was no discussion.

David Russell moved to recommend that the ACOG MPO Policy Committee allow the City of Norman to swap two projects on Lindsey Street from one federal funding year to another. The federal funds would stay in the fiscal years that were designated by Norman and the ACOG MPO Policy Committee previously. Matt Summers seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

D. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION ONLY:

1. Central Oklahoma Long Range Transit Plan

He said there will be a Virtual Town Hall meeting July 9, 2025, from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

2. Oklahoma City Diverging Diamond Interchange (DDI)

John Sharp said Chad Meisenburg, Public Works GO Bond Manager with Oklahoma City, would present this item. 3. Functional Classification Revisions for the ACOG Area

Lauren Wood highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum. Mr. Sharp said in the past if a mile was added to the functional classification system, you had to delete a mile from the functional classification system. That is not the rule anymore. Kevin Hegerberg asked if they could receive an explanation if their submittal was disqualified so they could see if they could re-submit their segment. Mr. Sharp said yes and that ACOG can wait until the end of the month to finalize the list.

4. Message for Recipients of U.S. Department of Transportation Funding

John Sharp suggested that the committee read the letter in the agenda from Secretary of Transportation Sean Duffy. He said ACOG received it from both FHWA and ODOT and wanted to make sure the committee members saw it.

5. Grant Opportunities

Ethan Mazzio highlighted the information regarding the three grants opportunities available as detailed in the agenda memorandum. Mr. Sharp asked the committee members to forward to ACOG any other grant opportunities they are aware of, and they will be included in this memorandum next month.

6. Projects in the ACOG MPO Transportation Management Area (TMA)

Chairman Sharp said this item will be discussed after this meeting with the entities who have projects they are working on. ODOT is here to answer their questions.

D. NEW BUSINESS

Clean Cities Coalition Annual Award Luncheon

Eric Pollard invited the committee members to attend the Clean Cities Coalition Annual Award Luncheon where they recognize impactful alternative fuel vehicle projects in the region. He said the fun part is that this year, the event will be at the Oklahoma City Zoo on May 28.

Bike to Work Day

Ethan Mazzio said at the front table there are flyers for Bike to Work Day.

Jose Jimenez-Rubio Leaving ACOG

Chairman Sharp said Jose Jimenez has been responsible for bike-pedestrian planning at ACOG for a couple of years, but has now taken a job in Broken Arrow, OK, so will be leaving us next week. ACOG has appreciated the good work he has done here. The committee applauded.

Tahjiba Tarannum Leaving ACOG

Mr. Sharp said we also have an intern, Tahjiba Tarannum, who just graduated from OU, and she has taken a job in Colorado. We appreciate all the work that she has done for ACOG. The committee applauded.

Encompass 2045 Plan Amendments

Michael Glessner asked about the email sent out for amendments to the Encompass 2045 Plan and wondered if it is still possible to provide updates. Mr. Sharp said yes, ACOG is still accepting street widenings, but bridges, interchanges, and pedestrian type projects are not needed.

Encompass 2050 Plan Development

He encouraged the committee to look for projects (widening, interchange, bridge, etc.) to provide later in the fall that they feel will happen before 2050 in their community, and give a rough estimate of what it might cost, keeping in mind inflation.

AMENDMENTS TO THE FFY 2024-2027 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

INFORMATION:

The following amendments have been proposed for the FFY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program:

- The Central Oklahoma Transportation and Parking Authority (COTPA) has submitted a request to amend the FFY 2025 Transit Element of the FFY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). COTPA is requesting the amendment (see attached letter) in order to program Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307 funds apportioned to COTPA. The funds will be used for a variety of tasks including preventative maintenance, paratransit service, service vehicle purchases, shop equipment, planning activities and studies. The remaining funds will be used for preventative maintenance and operating costs for the City of Edmond's Citylink. COTPA also requests to program FTA Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities funds, FTA Section 5337 State of Good Repair funds, FTA Section 5310 Innovative Coordinated Access and Mobility Grant funds, and RAISE Grant funds with this amendment. This Amendment does not supersede COTPA's previous amendments, but it adds to what was previously programmed.
- The City of Norman has submitted a request to amend the FFY 2025 Transit Element of the FFY 2024-2027 TIP. Norman is requesting the amendment (see attached letter) in order to program FTA Section 5307 funds apportioned to the city. The funds will be used for preventative maintenance, fixed route and paratransit operations, and security projects. Norman also requests to program FTA Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities funds with this amendment. The funds will be used for vehicle replacement.

These amendments ensure consistency among the TIP, Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), and the grant awards. Upon approval of the ACOG MPO Policy Committee, the requests will be forwarded to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) and then to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)/Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for final approval.

ACTION REQUESTED:

Consider recommending that the ACOG MPO Policy Committee amend the FFY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program by updating the COTPA FFY 2025 Transit Element and the Norman FFY 2025 Transit Element with the attached programs of projects, and submitting the same to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) for amendment of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

RE: Amendment One, FFY 2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Dear Mr. Sharp:

Please place this request for amending FFY 2025 Transit Element TIP on the June agendas of the ACOG MPO Technical Committee and the ACOG MPO Policy Committee. The Central Oklahoma Transportation and Parking Authority (COTPA) will rely on this TIP Amendment and ACOG's public notice as well as ACOG's public involvement process to satisfy the TIP notice requirement for this matter.

This TIP Amendment One is to program the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307 Formula funds apportioned to COTPA for FFY 2025. These activities will include Preventive Maintenance, Paratransit Service, Service Vehicles (6), Fare Collection Technology Solutions, Bus Rapid Transit - Pylons and Ticket Vending Machines - Repair/Replacement, Shop Equipment, Planning Activities (UPWP) and Studies, and Safety/Security funds for COTPA. The remaining balance will fund Preventive Maintenance and Operating Costs for the City of Edmond. Amendment One will also program FTA Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities funds for FFY 2025. These funds will be used for Fare Collection Technology Solutions. This TIP Amendment will also program FTA Section 5337 State of Good Repair funds for FFY 2022. These funds will be used for Bank Stabilization and Dredging the Oklahoma River. This Amendment will also program FTA Section 5310 Innovative Coordinated Access and Mobility Grant funds for FFY 2024. These funds will be used to purchase Vans (2), One Call/One Click Console Equipment, and Vehicle Safety/Tracking Equipment. Lastly, this TIP Amendment One will also program RAISE Grant funds for FFY 2025 for the City of Oklahoma City. This activity will include Bus Stops (360) and Sidewalks (10 miles). This Amendment does not supersede COTPA's FFY 2024 TIP Amendment Two, but it adds to what was previously programmed in Amendment Two.

INFORMATION:

ACOG is continuing its Air Quality Small Grant (AQSG) Program with a FY 2026 Call for Projects (CFP) this fall. The program serves to meet the goals of the federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Improvement Program and/or Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) by supporting projects that relieve congestion, reduce transportation emissions, and improve air quality. Applicants are required to provide a minimum of 20 percent in matching local funds, and grant awards are conferred on a reimbursement basis.

The AQSG Program funds small transportation infrastructure projects that demonstrate the ability to relieve congestion, reduce transportation emissions, and improve air quality in the Central Oklahoma region. This includes active transportation improvements, such as bicycle/pedestrian lighting and signage, sidewalks, bicycle lanes, and bicycle racks, shelters, lockers, and service/repair stations; transit improvements resulting in or associated with new or expanded service, such as signal and communications equipment, transit lines, stations, stops, and operating assistance; and congestion reduction efforts, such as traffic management/control services, traffic signalization projects, Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) projects, transit management systems, and traffic calming measures. A CFP was last held in FY 2024 with \$4,355,362 available for projects in the ACOG Adjusted Urbanized Area (UZA). The CFP was held from Tuesday, August 1, 2023, through Friday, September 29, 2023. As a result of that CFP, 11 projects were awarded at a total of \$4,355,362.

At the June meeting of the ACOG MPO Technical Committee (TC), ACOG staff will accept suggestions from the committee regarding changes to both the AQSG scoring criteria and program guidance. Proposed changes may be recommended for consideration to be voted on and approved by the committee at the August meeting in advance of the CFP in the fall.
