MINUTES-

1. CALL TO ORDER

Presiding Chair Tim Rudek called the meeting to order at 2:50 p.m.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - AUGUST 28, 2025

Councilmember Vickie Douglas made a motion to approve the minutes of the August 28, 2025, Garber-Wellington Association Policy Committee meeting. Councilmember Shelli Selby seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

3. STAFF REPORT

A. Drought Update

John Harrington said the drought has returned to Eastern Cleveland County and a small portion of Southeastern Oklahoma County. He said Central Oklahoma has not seen stage 2 drought for over a year. He said there is persistent drought in the S.W. part of Oklahoma. He said the entire state received some rain last week, which decreased the drought from five percent of the state to three percent.

Mr. Harrington said Oklahoma received 4 inches of recharge this year and that the state has already exceeded the annual recharge for the year.

Mr. Harrington said the long-term models show a weak La Nina for the next month. He said El Nino condition for next spring could bring more rain and moisture. He said there have been no hurricanes in the Gulf for the year.

John Sharp asked if there could be a high percentage of fires in the spring. John Harrington said due to the March winds there could be a possibility.

B. US Geological Survey (USGS) Study

Mr. Harrington said the water in the aquifer must be less than 100 years old to be contaminated with Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS). He said the data shows most of

the water from the Garber-Wellington Aquifer is up to 10,000 years old. He said the PFAS issue may be much more restricted to domestic wells.

Vice-Mayor Sody Clements asked if PFAS is dangerous for residents. Mr. Harrington said there is a debate on whether PFAS causes cancer. He said it has been determined that PFAS is hazardous to a resident's health.

C. Oklahoma Water Resources Board (OWRB) Limits Withdrawal Rates in NW Oklahoma

Mr. Harrington said the Oklahoma Water Resources Board (OWRB) reviewed its first major update to groundwater permit limits. He said this plan will cut allocations for new groundwater permits from one acre-foot per acre a year to half that amount. He said the Agriculture Assessor lobbied against the metering of wells. He said the last comprehensive aquifer analysis was completed in 1983 and is still in effect today.

Councilmember Chris Powell asked how the authorities enforce the new rule. Mr. Harrington said there has not been a lot of enforcement. He said there is no reliable data collection to know. Vice-Mayor Clements asked if the new rule will also restrict the data centers use of water. Mr. Harrington said they will only get one-acre.

4. PROGRESS REPORT

Mr. Harrington said ACOG is still looking for a replacement for his position. Mr. Sweeney added that they will continue to schedule interviews and should have news soon.

5. NEW BUSINESS

There was no new business to report.

6. ADJOURN

There being no other business, Chair Rudek adjourned the meeting at 3:45 p.m.

DROUGHT UPDATE

INFORMATION:

Extreme drought is creeping back to Central Oklahoma.

Extreme drought is now being mapped in southern Cleveland, McClain, Pottawatomie, and Seminole Counties. This is due to the very dry autumn that Oklahoma has experienced.

Recharge to the aquifer over the past few months continues to be negligible; however, the fall and winter months generally do not produce huge recharge numbers unless we get some rainfall from a stray hurricane that has hit the Texas Gulf Coast. This year not only have we had no hurricanes in the Gulf, but there have also been no hurricanes that have made landfall in the US.

The good news is that we have already exceeded the annual recharge for the year, so we have plenty of moisture to rely on for the dry months. In addition, the surface water situation still looks fairly good.

Looking forward, the long-term models show a weak La Nina may hang around until the end of the year. Then comes some good news - an El Nino condition for next spring. El Nino usually brings good moisture to this part of the world. So, this may be a very short-term drought that we are in, and we are in decent shape to manage a short-term drought.

CITY OF NEWCASTLE WASTE LOAD ALLOCATION (WLA) PROPOSAL ON WALNUT CREEK

INFORMATION

The City of Newcastle is proposing to discharge into Walnut Creek in McLain County as part of an expansion project which includes a new wastewater treatment system. Newcastle is proposing a new south service area encompassing approximately 21,475 acres, and desires to construct a new South Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) to serve this area. The proposed discharge for this South WWTP is the North Fork of Walnut Creek.

The proposed outfall would be discharged to the North Fork of Walnut Creek just downstream of Highway 62 bridge. Since this is a new discharge, a new waste load allocation (WLA) study is required by the ODEQ for approval and Oklahoma Water Quality 208 Plan amendment.

Newcastle authorized S2 Engineering, PLLC, for the preparation of the WLA report. S2 Engineering and its subconsultant Alliance Technical Group prepared this WLA study report for the City of Newcastle for ODEQ approval. ACOG staff provided technical assistance with the project and will be incorporating the results of this WLA study into the regional Water Quality Analysis Simulation Program (WASP) model to monitor the impact on the Canadian River system.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION HR 3898 - THE PERMIT ACT

INFORMATION

Officially titled the "Promoting Efficient Review for Modern Infrastructure Today Act," HR 3898 was introduced June 11, 2025 by Mike Collins (R-GA) and Sam Graves (R-MO). It aims to revise major parts of the federal law that governs water pollution and permitting — the Clean Water Act (CWA). It is expected to be on the House floor for a vote in the week of Dec 15-19. The PERMIT Act makes a number of changes to how the Clean Water Act is implemented, especially around permitting, definitions, and regulatory scope. Some of the notable elements:

REDEFINING "NAVIGABLE WATERS"

The bill would narrow the definition under the CWA to exclude — among others — waste-treatment systems, ephemeral/seasonal streams (those that flow only after precipitation), prior-converted cropland, groundwater, and other water features the federal government designates.

STREAMLINING PERMITS AND REGULATORY REVIEWS

The bill seeks to speed up and simplify permitting for projects - e.g., dredging, filling wetlands or waterways, wastewater discharges, pesticide runoff - by reducing regulatory burdens, clarifying permit terms, and limiting opportunities for delay or litigation under the CWA.

REFORM OF PERMIT/AUTHORIZATION PROCESSES

Changes include extending certain permit durations (e.g., general permits under the National Pollution Detection and Elimination System (NPDES) from 5 to 10 years), reducing uncertainty over wastewater discharge permits, clarifying when permits are needed, and limiting retroactive or preemptive vetoes by federal agencies under certain CWA provisions.

LIMITING STATE AND LOCAL OVERSIGHT AND PROTECTIONS

By narrowing federal jurisdiction and reducing permit requirements, the bill would also reduce scope for state-level or community-level protections, particularly for smaller water bodies, wetlands, and ephemeral streams.

In summary, this bill would scale back federal oversight of many waterbodies and leave them to the state-level planning agencies. It may streamline permitting processes in states with little or no federal waters.
