1. **Public Hearing and Action on** Amendments to the FFY 2026-2029 ACOG MPO Transportation Improvements Program: Jennifer Sebesta, Transportation Planning Services (TPS) Division Manager.

Jennifer Sebesta highlighted the information provided in the agenda memorandum.

Chair Selby opened the public hearing. There being no response from the public, the public hearing was closed.

Terry Arps made a motion to approve the amended FFY 2026-2029 Transportation Improvement Program by replacing the FFY 2029 local government Surface Transportation Block Grant - Urbanized Area (STBG-UZA) projects with the updated project lists, and amending the FFY 2026 local government projects to include the Air Quality Grant and Public Fleet Grant projects, and submitting the same to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) for amendment of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). 2. Consideration of Encompass 2050 Project Selection Criteria: Jennifer Sebesta, TPS Division Manager.

Mayor Vickie Douglas made a motion to approve the proposed Encompass 2050 Project Section Criteria. Mayor Phil Freeman seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

5. Transportation News and Update Report: John Sharp, Deputy Director

2050 Plan Scenario Planning Workshop

ACOG hosted the workshop, it was an opportunity for local stakeholders to discuss different options for how the area might grow in the future. Councilmember Matt Hinkle represented the ACOG Board for you. Kimley Horn and the Gooden Group are coordinating some of the public outreach for the plan to gather additional responses from a survey. One recent event was the Lunar New Year at the Myriad Gardens this Saturday. Next week there will be an event at Rose State on March 5 from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. and then on March 7, at Mitch Park Senior Center. More information will be forthcoming.

Oklahoma Dept. of Transportation (ODOT)

Lots of ODOT coordination as they are currently working on the development of the Statewide Freight Plan. Statewide Freight Plan Website extended through March 13. ACOG staff attended the quarterly State Transportation Innovation Committee and MPO Quarterly Coordination meeting. The last meeting also included Federal Highway and Federal Transit.

Road Improvement

ACOG and the City of Noble staff hosted a meeting to discuss future road improvements and possible developments adjacent to the future turnpike going through the eastern part of their community.

FY 2027 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Started the annual work program meetings with local members and agencies.

Congestion Management

A Stakeholders meeting was held earlier this month. Olsson, the consultant on this project, will be here in March to present the final report.

Intelligent Transportation Systems

Norman hosted local staff who are interested in Intelligent Transportation Systems.

Norman is opening its new Traffic Management Center that will help coordinate traffic lights and other traffic control devices throughout the community. An increased use of technology to assist in congestion relief is part of the goals of the Congestion Management Process (CMP).

Classen Bike Lane

ACOG staff is assisting the Oklahoma City staff with solutions for the Classen Blvd. bike lane, including a public meeting held at the downtown library earlier this month.

Bike Month

May is Bike Month and staff has begun planning some of the events that are taking place. If you have events in your community or would like some assistance, please let ACOG know.

U.S. Dept. of Energy

After the Department of Energy did not provide funding for ACOG's Central Oklahoma Clean Cities Coalition last year, ACOG just received a federal fiscal year 26 funding package totaling \$223,000. This is the largest award amount received in the Coalition's history and is a result of proactive ACOG federal policy advocacy and the strength of our Clean Cities Coalition.

Transportation Energy Partners (TEP)

Eric Pollard attended this Energy Independence Summit in Washington D.C. earlier this month to get fleet transportation industry updates and to visit Oklahoma congressional delegation offices to advocate for Clean Cities Department of Energy funding and other federal financial incentives for local fleets.

Air Quality Coordination

ACOG hosted a DEQ/ODOT Oklahoma MPO Air Quality coordination call on February 9, 2026. Participants discussed how local governments and the state can improve air quality and public health, as well as strategies to remain in attainment of federal air quality standards.

INFORMATION:

On March 9, ACOG opened a call for all regionally significant transportation projects to be included in the next Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Encompass 2050. Funds are not distributed as a result of this call for projects. However, there are many reasons to submit projects, including:

- For all federal programs (including STBG-UZA), only projects that are included in, or are consistent with, the MTP are eligible to receive funding
- Regionally significant roadway projects, from any funding source, need to be modeled to determine their impact on future mobility
- The identification of regional transportation priorities will direct the investment of federal funds
- Being listed in the MTP will help communicate to the public information concerning projects planned in each community

If your entity wishes to submit a project(s) for inclusion in the Encompass 2050 Plan, the following information will need to be received by ACOG **by Monday, April 6, 2026**:

- ACOG has developed a special application form for the future MTP projects in Project Tracker. Proposed project type, location, and estimated cost is required. Further refinement of the costs can be assigned at a later date by ACOG staff.
- The appropriate Encompass 2050 Project Scoring Worksheet for each project.
- A map of each proposed project showing its location, termini, street name(s), north arrow, and the names of nearby major streets. Projects may be mapped in or uploaded to ProjectTracker.

As required by the federal regulation, the financial strategy for Encompass 2050 must demonstrate a balance between the estimated costs and anticipated revenues for carrying out the long-range MTP. As a result, a set of project scoring criteria are used to evaluate and prioritize suggested projects. The Encompass 2050 Project Selection Criteria are only used if anticipated revenues are not enough to cover the cost of all proposed projects.

INFORMATION:

As part of the development of Encompass 2050, some control totals/guidelines for the 2050 population for the ACOG TMA are required. At the September 2025 MPO Technical & Policy Committee meetings, staff presented county population projections for 2050. These projections were gathered from the Oklahoma Department of Commerce (ODOC), Woods and Poole (W&P) Economics Inc., and past census trend data were used to evaluate future county projections. Preliminary county projections that were selected are highlighted in yellow in [Table 1](#).

For modeling purposes and scenario planning, the population forecasts for city level geography also have to be developed. As a starting point for 2050 population figures, each entity in each county was given the same portion of the county population total, as the 2020 base year. Next, staff looked at the recent population trends back to 2000 to see if this new 2050 population figure was realistic, based on trend data.

In some cases, local entities had comprehensive plans that had future population forecasts. These forecasts were included in Table 2 as a guide and had a wide variety of future year dates. If no forecasts were available, then “None” was listed in [Table 2](#).

The Adjusted 2050 Column was added to provide more realistic estimates of future population forecasts. The 2050 population numbers highlighted in yellow show the adjusted numbers in Table 2. **Additional information has been gathered from Blanchard and Newcastle.** Their Adjusted 2050 numbers were recently updated to reflect their more recent growth trends. The 2050 TMA population total would then reach 1,923,316, an increase of 44.3 percent from the 2020 base year.

CONGESTION MANAGEMENT PROCESS STATUS

INFORMATION

Over the past year, ACOG has worked with various stakeholders to update the regional Congestion Management Process (CMP). The purpose of the CMP is to provide a systematic and regionally accepted approach for managing congestion that provides accurate information on transportation performance and assesses alternative strategies for congestion management. The consultant for the project, Olsson, has performed the following tasks:

- Held a number of stakeholder meetings
- Conducted a congested corridor analysis
- Released a survey to receive feedback on possible local solutions to congested corridors
- Provided technical memos
- Developed a CMP Strategies Toolbox

One of the highlights of the CMP has been the regional coordination and cooperation between the local communities and ODOT staff. This will now be an ongoing collaboration that was initially outlined in ODOT's ITS and TSMA Strategic Plan report (2024), which can be found here: <https://oklahoma.gov/odot/about-us/odot-information.html>.

The [draft CMP report](#) is now available for review. The document includes a description and assessment of the regional CMP network, quantitative congestion indicators and related performance measures for ongoing analysis, and various strategies to alleviate congestion at a regional level.
