3. Preliminary 2050 ACOG Transportation Management Area (TMA) County and City Population Projections.

John Sharp highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum. There is concern about the adjusted 2050 totals, which are quite high. He said communities must have capacity to provide services for these future population numbers. The implication if these numbers are used is that traffic could vastly increase, and additional water supplies and water treatment plants must be added. Not all the communities have the financial capacity for these improvements.

Mr. Sharp said Newcastle is growing and they are getting a new hospital that will bring jobs and possibly residents also. David Russell asked John Sharp what he had forecasted for Mustang that they would lose 10 percent of their population between 2025 and 2050.

There was a discussion regarding affordable housing in their community.

BikeFest will take place Sunday, May 3, 2026, from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Wheeler Ferris Wheel (1701 S. Western Ave., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma).

National Bike & Roll to School Day will take place Wednesday, May 6, 2026. The City of Oklahoma City is working to update its planning and development code. Oklahoma City's current planning code was written in the 1980s and treats nearly the entire city like a suburb. This one-size-fits-all approach no longer reflects the city's character, needs, or potential.

On Tuesday, March 10, 2026, the City of Oklahoma City is hosting a public meeting at the Belle Isle Library (5501 N Villa Ave, Oklahoma City, OK 73112) from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. Please note that this outreach meeting is focused on code changes for Central Oklahoma City residents. Residents of Central Oklahoma City are invited to learn more about zoning tools and to provide their feedback on how the city can develop, customize, and refine the code to meet the neighborhood needs of Central Oklahoma City residents.. Future meetings (to be announced) will gather feedback focused on suburban and rural areas of Oklahoma City.

DISCUSSION OF ZONING CODE UPDATES IN ACOG MUNICIPALITIES

INFORMATION

Zoning ordinances establish definitions for the different uses of land and define the areas of a community where a given use of land may be allowable or unallowable. Typically, zoning codes demarcate land uses through three factors:

1. The type of activity taking place on a given parcel of land, such as residential, commercial, or industrial;
2. The shape of a building as it relates to nearby public right of way and surrounding context, such as height; and
3. The bulk of a building as it relates to the land on which it sits, such as its lot setback and orientation

Historically, most zoning codes in the United States have followed the typical “Euclidean” model described above. In recent decades, a rising number of communities have observed negative environmental and socioeconomic effects attributable to the Euclidean model, spurring planners and elected officials to explore modifications and alternatives that best fit their communities’ challenges. Today, communities across the country employ a variety of zoning codes, including mixed-use zoning, form-based codes, performance- and incentive-driven zoning, and others.

Ultimately, zoning ordinances play a key role in municipalities, serving as the principal tool by which a community’s vision – articulated through a comprehensive plan, corridor plan, or neighborhood plan – is implemented and achieved.

To kick off a conversation about updating zoning codes, Guthrie Planning Director Dan Kassik will present on key provisions and lessons learned during the City of Guthrie’s 2025 Zoning Code Update at the March 12 APTAC meeting.

INFORMATION

As part of the development of Encompass 2050, some control totals/guidelines for the 2050 population for the ACOG TMA are required. At the September 2025 MPO Technical & Policy Committee meetings, staff presented county population projections for 2050. These projections were gathered from the Oklahoma Department of Commerce (ODOC), Woods and Poole (W&P) Economics Inc., and past census trend data were used to evaluate future county projections. Preliminary county projections that were selected are highlighted in yellow in [Table 1](#).

For modeling purposes and scenario planning, the population forecasts for city level geography also have to be developed. As a starting point for 2050 population figures, each entity in each county was given the same portion of the county population total, as the 2020 base year. Next, staff looked at the recent population trends back to 2000 to see if this new 2050 population figure was realistic, based on trend data.

In some cases, local entities had comprehensive plans that had future population forecasts. These forecasts were included in Table 2 as a guide and had a wide variety of future year dates. If no forecasts were available, then "None" was listed in [Table 2](#).

The Adjusted 2050 Column was added to provide more realistic estimates of future population forecasts. The 2050 population numbers highlighted in yellow show the adjusted numbers in Table 2. **Additional information has been gathered from Blanchard and Newcastle.** Their Adjusted 2050 numbers were recently updated to reflect their more recent growth trends. The 2050 TMA population total would then reach 1,923,316, an increase of 44.3 percent from the 2020 base year.
